Dear Parents/Carers

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you to our school.

Chulmleigh College is a fully comprehensive secondary school serving pupils between the ages of 11 and 16. We have a clear aim: to give every pupil an excellent education, enabling the best GCSE results possible, as well as ensuring that all pupils leave us with the tools they need to successfully navigate their next steps in life.

Over the last few years our school has grown by more than 40%, as our reputation across Devon is such that we are the chosen school for many families who live a great distance outside our designated school area. We are incredibly proud of this reputation and every member of staff works hard to sustain it. Being fully aware of the issues which can limit the choice of school for rural families, several years ago we introduced the Chulmleigh School Transport service, for those who are not eligible for free school transport. The service has helped numerous families to access our school, despite the lack of public transport so prevalent in rural communities.

In recent years our results have been some of the best in the region. We are very proud of these academic results, but they are also underpinned by a long tradition in music, outdoor education, the arts and sport. At Chulmleigh College we have high expectations of our pupils: excellent standards of behaviour, a strict uniform policy and courtesy at all times – we believe this provides the best possible learning environment. We are also proud of the excellent relationships we have with our pupils, families and friends within the community.

The last years have been difficult for everyone, but we have adapted and have not let the barriers created by the pandemic to interrupt our momentum - education is simply too important for the future of our young people.

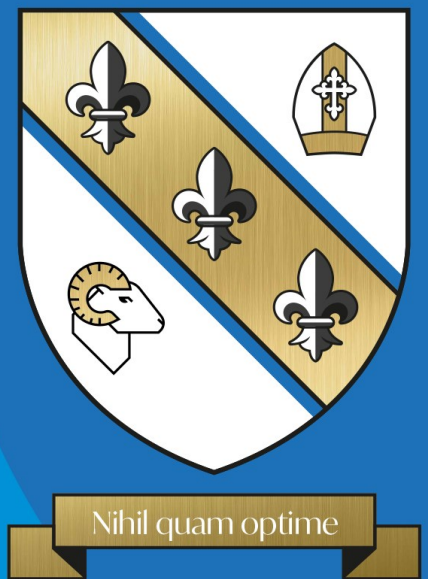

Curriculum

KEY STAGE 3 (YEARS 7-9)

The first three years of secondary school are about breadth. We believe that a broad education is essential, and our academic provision follows the National Curriculum. Key Stage 3 builds on the knowledge and skills of Key Stage 2, and also lays the foundations for GCSE and further study. Pupils will study the following subjects:

English and English Literature, Mathematics, Sciences, French, Geography, History, Religion, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education, Computer Science, Art, Drama, Music, Food and Nutrition and Design and Technology.



KEY STAGE 4 (YEARS 10 & 11)

Pupils begin GCSE study formally in Year 10, and are given the opportunity to specialise in subjects that are in addition to their core areas of study. In the Spring Term of Year 9, pupils may personalise their curriculum by choosing subjects from the optional block, which will determine what their programme of study will be in Years 10 and 11. To support this process the College produces a booklet, and has a number of events that enable parents and pupils to find out more about the courses on offer.

The Key Stage Four Programme of Study is structured as follows:

The Compulsory Curriculum (all pupils will study):

- GCSE English
- GCSE English Literature
- GCSE Mathematics
- GCSE Combined Science - two GCSEs (pupils can opt for separate sciences in the options)
- GCSE French
- GCSE Geography or History (both can be studied within the options)
- GCSE Religious Studies
- Physical Education (non-assessed)
- Personal, Social and Health Education (non-assessed)

Arrangement of Teaching Groups

The College operates a mixed system, with some linear setting with mixed groups. Decisions on the arrangements of classes in Year 7 are made using information from our feeder primary schools, SATS results and baseline testing in school.

We determine the structure of Year 7 classes prior to pupils starting in September, but some movement is natural and is encouraged. Typically the College operates with a number of mixed ability sets and faster moving accelerated classes, but this always depends on the cohort and what is best for them.

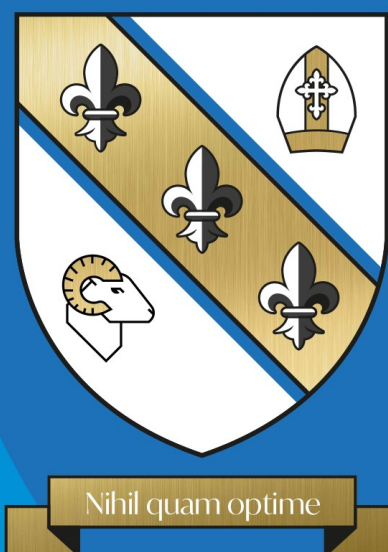
Effort is valued highly at the College, and we reward pupils who work hard, regardless of their attainment grades.

Every half term we celebrate pupils' effort across all their subjects. Each pupil is given an 'effort' grade, and the top ten pupils in each year group with the most grade ones are awarded a certificate and badge. This begins with a Half Bronze, followed by Bronze, Half Silver, Silver, Half Gold and finally - if a pupil is in the top ten for effort in each half term - the Gold award. In recognition of the pupils who

may have just missed out, but whose hard work we still wish to celebrate, we present 'Intermediate Scholar Awards' to the next highest scoring five boys and five girls.

These awards are highly prized, and are awarded by the Executive Headteacher during assemblies. We give pride of place to the Scholar Award lists and photographs in displays around the College.

Music Tuition & Ensembles

Music Tuition

Music Tuition at the College is delivered by a team of seven staff, all of whom have been working with our pupils for a number of years. Together these experienced, qualified professional music tutors have in excess of 100+ pupils every year. Music tuition at Chulmleigh College is for anyone who wants to learn, if we can possibly make it happen!

Pupils must provide their own instruments. Rental and rent-to-buy schemes are available from music shops and Devon County also has a hire scheme. We do have a number of flutes, clarinets, saxophones, trumpets, trombones, violins and cellos available for loan. Also, if it's portable (sadly that rules out the piano and drum kit!) then VAT-free purchases are possible through the College.

We have been successful in bidding for a limited amount of support funds to offer bursaries to pupils who otherwise might not be able to afford lessons. Some will already qualify for a 50% reduction if on the Pupil Premium register.

Ensemble Opportunities

The College Orchestra rehearses during Wednesday lunchtimes. It is for instrumentalists who play a woodwind, brass or bowed string instrument. There are also a small number of pianists, guitars and percussionists used in some pieces. Arrangements of music in a range of styles, along with original compositions, are prepared for performance at the College's main large concerts in December and May. The Orchestra also leads the music at the College's Harvest and Christmas Festivals. We attend the Devon Schools Mix Festival and participate in the Devon Music Education Hub's collaboration with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra.

Chulmleigh Music Academy



At CMAc we have the time for more intensive and focussed specific ensembles to complement the Orchestra and Singers. CMAc takes place at the College on Wednesdays, from immediately after school to 5pm. In the past few years, we have been very fortunate to secure external funding through the Devon Music Education Hub (DMEH), to support instrumental and vocal ensembles for pupils in Key Stages 2 to 4.

CMAc is proving popular with our young musicians, but is also developing a good reputation further afield. In a recent visit, the Director of the DMEH brought the heads of music services from Cornwall, Somerset and Gloucester to have a look at what we do, and feedback included, "The way things are being done at Chulmleigh is the right way. I would like to see the same in Gloucester".

CMAc Brass, CMAc Woodwind and CMAc String ensembles are led by our visiting instrumental staff of Mr Loysen, Mr Smith and Mrs Craddock. All of these have extensive experience and are overseen by Mr Cookson, College Director of Music.

Teachers Rock Youth Choir

The Teachers Rock Youth Choir is a fantastic organisation delivering high quality ensemble singing across the region. We are fortunate that its founder and CEO, Debbie Kent, runs our own branch of TRY hosted at CMAc. The choir is open to pupils from Key Stage 2 upwards. Recent outside events included performing at Exeter Cathedral and at the National Music Education Expo at London's Olympia.

Drama



In addition to Drama as part of the curriculum, our vibrant Drama department holds a daily lunchtime club, which is run as an 'open studio'. Pupils can use the space to create, as well as using the lighting and design resources. The studio provides a well-equipped resource for creativity, and the club is very popular amongst pupils of all ages.

In recent years, Year 10 Drama pupils have taken part in the annual Shakespeare Schools Festival, the world's largest youth drama festival with up to 30,000 participants, 1000 schools and 136 theatres, all as part of one Festival.

The Festival, the Shakespeare Schools Foundation's flagship project, uses the unique power of performance to develop self esteem, articulacy, literacy and teamwork; skills that transform lives.

In 2023, the performance was 'Romeo & Juliet', involving 27 pupils. The art, music and drama departments were all involved in the production, and younger pupils made the props.

The final performance, in front of 300 people at the Exeter Phoenix Theatre, was an experience the pupils will never forget - improving their confidence massively as well as enhancing their performance skills heading towards their GCSEs.

LAMDA

The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art is one of the UK's oldest drama schools. We are delighted to offer LAMDA tuition and accredited exams as an *extra-curricular option*; they are highly prestigious and can count towards the UCAS points system when applying to universities and colleges. The syllabus is designed to develop good reading skills, increasing fluency and understanding and aims to expand vocabulary to improve powers and self-expression. Pupils' confidence in

speaking and listening improves, as does their recall of information and memory.

Our LAMDA teacher Antonia Whittick trained at both the Guildford School of Acting and RADA, and spent several years with the RSC with their innovative community projects and their Regent's Park Seasons. She also worked as a professional actress, mainly in theatre with some television and radio work, and has been involved in numerous Theatre-in-Education projects around the country.

Outdoor Education

With Dartmoor, Exmoor and the North Devon coast all a short drive from the College, it's not surprising that we have a thriving and varied outdoor education programme!

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the world's leading youth achievement award, giving young people the opportunity to be the very best they can be.

DofE at the College has been developed to provide valuable teamwork experience, both through voluntary work and within school. Pupils build their self-confidence by setting goals and working towards them and will also get to push their boundaries - go exploring, discover new things about the world around them, and hopefully, discover something new about themselves.

In addition to encouraging young people to improve physical fitness, develop new skills and give time to worthy causes, the College runs several DofE expeditions every year, with exciting locations including Dartmoor, Bodmin, Exmoor, the Quantocks, Snowdonia and the Lake District.

We have around 80 pupils participating in the scheme at any time and the completion rate is very high. We have a good number of qualified and experienced staff to help pupils meet their goals and expand their horizons.

The Ten Tors Challenge

The Ten Tors Challenge is not for the faint-hearted! It involves months of arduous training in some of the worst conditions possible on Dartmoor, including fog, hail, rain, snow or high winds, over increasingly challenging distances with increasingly heavy backpacks.

We pride ourselves on the strengths of the Ten Tors teams we produce at the College, with teamwork, determination, and positive attitudes complementing the navigation and survival skills developed over the course of the training.

And More...

These are just some of the outdoor education opportunities we provide for our pupils, and the experiences don't stop when they leave the College, as pupils can carry on with Sea Moor Explore.

Our team of volunteers includes former pupils whose participation in these activities has left them with a lifetime love of adventure and the great outdoors. We also actively encourage adventurous parents to get their boots muddy volunteering with us!

Sea Moor Explore Expand your Horizon...

Set up by pupils, ex-pupils, parents and staff of Chulmleigh College, Sea Moor Explore is an exciting club which aims to provide fun and adventurous outdoor activities for young people in North and Mid-Devon.

Whilst fervour for adventure is tremendous, practical opportunities are few and far between, even though North Devon and the rest of the UK offer an abundance of thrilling places to explore. Sea Moor Explore aims to provide young people with the chance to participate in adventurous activities in the great outdoors, to inspire them to undertake escapades of their own, and to promote and encourage personal development through engagement in these adventures.



We have half-termly trips out to the moor, rivers, lakes, beaches, coastline and woodland, to climb, surf, sail, walk and cycle etc. These events are for pupils of secondary school and sixth form age, who wish to share challenging outdoor activities with like-minded people of their own age. Recent activities have included: stand-up paddle-boarding and kayaking in Exeter, horse riding on Exmoor, skiing in Plymouth, a visit to the Wake Park near Bideford, climbing at Rock and Rapid, surfing at Saunton, and coasteering along the glorious North Devon coast.

As well as planned activities, we have trained teams to complete in the Ten Tors Challenge since 2018. In 2023, we entered teams at all three distances: 35, 45 and 55 miles. Many of the participants are current and former pupils at Chulmleigh, who learnt to be self-sufficient in navigating and camping on the moor during the challenge.
